## FROM PASTOR MICHAEL



#### A New Thing!

As I write this it is still below zero on Ash Wednesday with the anticipation of snow this evening and colder temperatures in the days to come that will soon pass. Friends, it is still winter as we anticipate the coming of spring, warmer temperatures, buds breaking forth, life emerging – a sort of yearly resurrection.

On Ash Wednesday we were marked with ashes as we received the words – "Remember that you are God's beloved dust, and to God's

beloved dust you shall return." Stardust, the same dust from which the whole cosmos is created from . . . and returns to. Some of the brighter stars we see on a clear night, are brightest because they are dying, their life cycle is ending, to dust it all, all shall return.

In recent months, at Community Church of Walker UCC, we have been starkly reminded of the fragility of life with the sudden death of good friends. We have been reminded of our own mortality. Life is a gift, a miracle filled with blessing, wonder, joy, sorrow, grief. From the moment of birth our days are numbered. At best, in all circumstances, it is the hope that we will live life and live it abundantly, fully, with abandon.

As I look out the window, I see snow and trees that are stripped of leaves. They appear to be lifeless, but they will slowly come to life again. They remind us death is not the end. There is more to come. And predictably and thankfully, we are not in control of the life cycle . . . we are here to enjoy the ride.

In recent days, I have been deeply pondering the life of "Church". Recently attendance at our worship services has been slim. (And friends, we are not alone) I know that "where two are three are gathered . . ." Christ will be present. Worship is good, vibrant . . . but if feels too small. So, I wonder about the weeks, months, and years to come? Will we thrive? Will we survive? Then I think to myself, in a sense CCOWUCC has always been a living thing, Over 125 years ago this congregation was born and has lived these many years. Are institutions immune to life cycle's – no. Do we age – yes! In ten, fifteen, twenty-five years . . . and on will we be a vibrant presence in the Walker community? Optimistically, I say yes – for the Spirit and Presence of the Holy is with us. Will we be the same as we are today – no. So what then?

Many years ago Ed Lindeman, President of Whitworth College, introduced me to the phrase "We must be intentional about the future – yet not completely tethered to a specific outcome!" Plan, work, dream, risk, try, fail, succeed . . . be intentional about the future – and always trust that God is in the mix and God will lead you to surprise! Have faith!

I invite you to read the words of Mary Kay DuChene who writes for LeaderWise. Her article is entitled "What if . . . ?" In part it reads,

I heard the trope a lot: "If only the young people would come back to church, and other variations on the theme." What I wanted to ask him was, "What if God has the church right where God wants it to be? What then?" Since that time, I've had the opportunity to ask that question many times. Sometimes, it stops people in their tracks.

**Consider the core theological belief of death and resurrection. Death is part of life, and out of death comes new life.** The Prophet Isaiah (among others) reminds us that God does new things through death—and through us. When we dig our heels in, refusing to follow where God is leading . . . well, God just keeps moving on, doing whatever new thing God is doing. We eventually die, like the generation in the wilderness, or we get on board to whatever the new thing is that God is doing.

But what new thing IS God doing? We don't know, and that not knowing is hard. But we know a couple things we can hang onto like a life-line: God wants us to love God with all our hearts, souls, and minds, and love our neighbors (definition: ALL people) as ourselves. What if, at your next board meeting or fellowship time after worship, you looked at your fellow faithful and asked these questions:

- What if God has our church right where God wants it to be? What, then, would we do? How, then, would we lead our church and ourselves?
- What new thing might God be leading us to, if we simply rest on the deep belief that
  God wants us to lead lives of faith that express our deep love for the Divine, and also to
  love our neighbors as ourselves. (As a matter of fact, Jesus said what you do to the other
  you also do to him. In other words, loving your neighbor as yourself IS loving God with all
  you have and all you are.)

In this American society, when success seems measured by continual growth and improvement, it's hard to see decline around us and label it as anything but failure. But what if what's happening isn't actually decline or failure? What if it's the catalyst to birth something new that only God can imagine? What if it's reformation? What if it's necessary for resurrection? Those are deeply spiritual and theological commitments, and leaning into them might just be an act of loving God with your whole being. It certainly requires trusting God deeply. And that is a faithful response too.

I too ask myself, ask you – "What if God has CCOWUCC exactly where God want's us to be  $\dots$ , become?" With courage and vision may we ponder what it is that God is calling us to do.  $\dots$  A New Thing!



## Book Conversation

On Wednesday, March 1<sup>st</sup> at 7:00 pm via zoom we will complete our read of "Speak to the Earth and It Will Teach You" as we read the section on "Clouds".



On Wednesday March 8<sup>th</sup> – March 22<sup>nd</sup> <u>All are invited</u> (including those who have read the book and those who have not) to have a bowl of **SOUP** and then a Lenten Book Conversation on renowned historian Jon Meacham's book "The Hope of Glory – Reflections on the Last Words of Jesus from the Cross".

It is written – For Jon Meacham, as for believers worldwide, the events of Good Friday and Easter reveal essential truths about Christianity. A former vestryman of Trinity Church Wall Street and St. Thomas Church Fifth Avenue, Meacham delves into that intersection of faith and history in this meditation on the seven phrases Jesus spoke from the cross.

Beginning with "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do" and ending with "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit," Meacham captures for the reader how these words epitomize Jesus's message of love, not hate; grace, not rage; and, rather than vengeance, extraordinary mercy. For each saying, Meacham composes an essay on the origins of Christianity and how Jesus's final words created a foundation for oral and written traditions that upended the very order of the world.

Writing in a tone more intimate than any of his previous works, Jon Meacham returns us to the moment that transformed Jesus from a historical figure into the proclaimed Son of God, worshiped by billions.

The format of the conversations will be *In-Person and Zoom at the church*. The gathering will begin with soup (you may choose to bring a sandwich) at 6:00 pm. Conversation about the book will begin about 6:45 and will end around 8:00 pm.
