

FROM PASTOR MICHAEL



Seasons

By the time you read this, hopefully all the snow will be gone, the trees will begin budding and blossoming, the ice on the lakes with be breaking up allowing us to see loons sitting on the waves and we will be able to float upon the lakes. These are the seasons that we so enjoy, watch, experience and sometimes they challenge us. So too, there are seasons in the church – we are currently in the season of Easter, resurrection, new hope, and possibilities beyond our imaginations.

What is the season we are living through now. I suspect we, you and me, and the world are on the cusp of a paradigmatic shift, from the "old ways" to something that I hope will usher in a kinder, gentler, more prophetic time. It is springtime. The risk, though, is that the world can become overwhelmed and destroyed by those who are resisting this springtime birth to a way of being. And I admit, I may not be witness to its completion.

In our time and culture there is a virulent like infection that is leading to misbehavior and destructive choices. It causes people to move only from fear, not hope. It causes people to shut doors, build walls, and respond with stupidity and hate. The highest values are "my rights, my way", rather than seeing and responding to the needs of the whole. A young person's basketball rolls onto the neighbor's lawn – the response is to shoot the father and wound the child. A cheerleader gets in the wrong car, goes back to her own car, rolls down the window to apologize – she and her friend are shot. A young woman drives into the wrong driveway, is backing out, she is shot and killed. Yes, these are extreme examples – but it seems they occur almost daily.

On the other hand, Kareem Abdul-Jabbar sold his four championship rings and three MVP awards among other memorabilia items years ago. At the time, the sale was worth \$2.8 million, which Abdul-Jabbar used to help support a youth education program. Students walk out of classrooms to stand at the Capitol building in Tennessee to encourage their legislators to pass common sense gun laws – for theirs and others' safety. Churches throughout Minnesota and the nation are making commitments to "go green" and reduce their carbon footprint to combat a changing and destructive climate. A soldier in Rwanda's civil war burned a village. Through the "Truth and Reconciliation" process, with the help of the villagers he/they are rebuilding buildings destroyed by him. Yes, these are just a few examples of the "God" work being done throughout the world. These are the examples of the paradigm shift we are living through.

1st Peter, chapter 2 speaks to the pain and suffering of being enslaved, oppressed, and treated cruelly. We are called to respond. "²¹ It was for this that you were called, since Christ suffered for you in just this way and left you an example. You must follow in the footsteps of Christ, ²² who did no wrong, who spoke no deceit, ²³ who did not return insults when insulted, who, when made to suffer, did not counter with threats. Instead, Christ trusted the One who judges justly."


In a recent **Sermon Brainwave** from Luther Seminary, Matt Skinner reminds us to not fetishize suffering. Joy J. Moore in the same conversation says – "When I look at what my ancestors experienced and what they have dealt with, out of a Christian accountability they did not take action against their perpetrators. That becomes a more hopeful word for those who claim to be Christian and who want to carry a gun. Who claim to be Christian and who want to carry a gun. Who claim to be Christian and want to storm the steps of a capitol. Who claim to be Christian and want to kidnap a governor. Who claim to be Christian and want to cancel people. I just wonder what it would look like if extending the invitation for people to, in the presence of their enemies, to let God give them their sustenance. To let the risen Christ offer them abundant life and not be seduced by the perishable gold and of this world."

May you and me, with the leadership of Creator, Christ, and Spirit usher in this paradigm shift that moves us to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly upon the earth, with each other and with God. This paradigm shift, of course, is movement into the realm (kingdom) of God.

You say you are pro-life,


yet you are against ensuring affordable healthcare for pregnant women before and after they give birth.
