

A New Story

Last week, I was in Philadelphia – and I wandered over to Independence Square to gaze at



the stunning portraits of the central figures of the American Revolution on display at the old Second Bank of the United States. The personalities of the founders of the country came PATRIOT

alive for me in those old paintings. As I read the biographies shown below the pictures, I saw that each of them experienced a unique version of the story of the American revolution. Each one of them experienced a different slice of

that history. Each of them had a somewhat different set of aspirations for the country. Each had a different understanding of what it meant to be united and what it meant to be states! None of them could have foretold what would become of the new nation they had created.

Today our nation faces a dire threat to the survival of the democracy those people established. And it seems to me that part of what is needed to save our democracy is a new story of America. A story that is inspiring and redemptive and transformative, and at the same time is realistic and honest and unvarnished. A gospel story for America, you might say. One that lifts up the truly enlightened vision of the people who founded the United States, while recognizing that those people were far from living up to their own ideals. A story of America that remembers the fits and starts and back-slides and forward pushes we've made to fulfill that original vision in ways going far beyond what those founders could have imagined in their historical and cultural context.

In the media today, I hear two conflicting versions of America's story. In one version, America is the product of a "virgin birth", with its founders inspired by God to set our nation forward toward a manifest destiny of greatness and goodness. Another version is that of a nation founded by white settler colonialist oppressors of native Americans and Black people, establishing a legacy of racism and capitalist domination that persists to this day.

We need an alternative that is both based in fact and imbued with inspiration. We need a new story so that we can claim a new kind of patriotism, a love of country that honors what is good in our story and moves us to right what is wrong in it. A patriotism that propels us into action for liberty and justice for all, not a patriotism that worships a fantasized past. We need a new American story, putting together both the dim and the bright pieces in a way that extrapolates from the best of our founders' visions, aiming us to better and to beyond what they could have imagined.

Gazing at those portraits of the real people - noble, yet flawed - inspired, yet culturally constrained - who cobbled together a form of government unique in its time, I gained a new level of respect for them, as well as a new level of respect for Americans today who are striving to make our country live up to the highest in our founders' ideals. For each of those founders, until their dying days, the United States was a canvas not nearly as finished as the ones on which their portraits were painted. Nor is that canvas finished today.

Let us take up our brushes and do our part to complete the picture, to add to the story, to honor and love our country with our action for a more perfect union...


Book Conversation – Begins Wednesday June 12th

Did You Know?

Our Church's History 1959



On January 18, 1959, new hymnals were presented and dedicated. Some of these were given as memorials, the balance being furnished by the Ladies Fellowship. On January 25th, the newly drawn Constitution and By-Laws were formally adopted at the Annual Meeting. On May 11, 1959 Rev. W.E. hammond, Pastor Emeritus of the Community Church, passed away at the Bemidji Hospital after a long illness. Burial was in the family plot in Aitkin, Minnesota. One of the noteworthy events of 1959, was that Mrs. Harold Mercier was chosen a delegate from Minnesota to the second General Synod of the United Church of Christ in Oberlin, Ohio. 1960

In 1960, the membership gave serious thought to an expansion program. Several options were considered. Early morning services were commenced on June 26. 1960, with a 7:30 a.m. service and a second service held at 11:00 a.m. This schedule was used during the summer to accommodate the increased tourist attendance. A Dedication Service was held on July 31, 1960, for the dedication of the "Willam E. Hammond Memorial Chimes". Presentation of the memorial was made by J.N. Licke Rev. Harold Maimborg who read the scripture and gave the prayer of dedication and acceptance of the memorial. On October 30, 1960, the Trustees and members of the Church Council presented to the church membership an offer by the John Andrus family to provide gratis, three acres of land for a site for a new church; the offer was gratefully accepted. During the year, a series of Sunday night meetings were held to discuss pros and cons on the adoption of the Constitution of the United Church of Christ for the Union Merger with the Northern Synod of the Evangelical and Reformed Church.

1961

On September 24, 1961, it was moved, seconded, and unanimously carried, to build a new church rather than repair the old one. On November 25, the building committee recommended the Andrus Site for the new building. The proposed budget for 1962 was \$9,307.00.


1962

At the Council meeting, on March 1962, Mrs. Henry Hagen was appointed director of a building fund drive. In April, Mr. Leo Baldwin, of the Congregational Conference, met with the membership to assist in the organization of such a drive. In June, 1962, Jyring & Whiteman of Hibbing, Minnesota, were hired as architects, and were instructed to draw plans and specifications for the new building. Survey of the Church Site was made in September by the County Surveyor and Mr. Louis Tausch. Carl Steadland made up the final plat. The total tract contained 3.65 acres. On September 25, 1962. at 10 a.m., a State Conference Meeting was held in St. Paul to change from "Congregational Conference of Minnesota" to Minnesota Conference of the "United Church of Christ". On November 7, 1962, Articles of Agreement to consolidate, the "Congregational Conference of Minnesota" and the "Northern Synod of the Evangelical and Reformed Church", to form the Minnesota Conference of the United Church of Christ, were formally signed at the Conference Office in Minneapolis. Under four departments, the Conference

will carry on its work in Christian Education, Church Ministry, Lay Life and Work, and Our Christian World Mission.

1963

January 13, 1963, the architects were instructed to draw final plans for approval. Deed to the Church Site was received from the Andrus Family. On June 2, 1963, the old parsonage was sold to J.L. Licke. Groundbreaking services for the new church were held on June 16, 1963. On August 8, 1963, the Trustees authorized issuance of a church mortgage on the church building, amount not to exceed \$50,000.00. On November 15, 1963 a church mortgage was executed and filed with First National Bank of Walker. The amount of the loan was \$46,000.00.
